Rare and Vagrant Birds 2015-16

Northern Rockhopper Penguin Eudyptes moseleyi

The bird at the Murrell Rockhopper colony returned again this season and when seen on the 2nd December appeared to be mated with a Southern Rockhopper where it was seen to be protecting its mate on the nest, but a visit on the 12th December to the site revealed a pair of Southern Rockhoppers brooding a chick, Mike Morrison. Seen again on the 23rd December standing alone at the edge of the colony, Adrian Lowe.

Great Grebe Podiceps major

Two birds were seen on the water off the sand beach at Round Pond by Brian and Judy Summers on the 16th January, ten days later one was seen at the west end of Stanley Harbour by Alan Henry (may possibly be one of the two) David Castle also reported one at the head of Stanley Harbour on the 11th March.

Snow Petrel Pagodroma nivea

Alan Henry photographed a single bird in the south of the zone in Falkland waters on the 7th October.

Cattle Egret Bubulcus ibis

The first report this year was of a single bird with a herd of cattle near Monty Dean's, Green Patch by Derek Pettersson on the 25th March. Eight birds were seen by Jeanette Clarke at Sand Point, Lorenzo on the 1st April. On the 16th April Kristiane Thorsen reported 80+ birds at the Market Garden, Stanley, Very cold at the time with snow squalls there were no sign of the birds the next day. Two birds were seen flying around Fitzroy Road East on the morning of the 22nd April Mike & Sue Morrison.

Cinnamon Teal Anas cyanoptera

The male bird reported in the last report remained in the area of Boxer Bridge and Cape Pembroke, seen by Sue Morrison at Boxer Bridge on the 16th July and 22nd August and Long Pond on the 30th August, seen on flood water to the east of runway at Stanley airport on the 23rd September and 5th October. On the Large Pond east of the airport on the 11th and 16th October. The last sighting was on Surf Bay Pond on the 18th October Mike & Sue Morrison.

Chimango Caracara Milvago chimango

A single bird at New Island on the 21st December, reported by Charlene Rowland who said it stayed in the area for a couple of days.

White-backed Stilt Himantopus melanurus

A single bird at Whalebone Cove, Cape Pembroke first seen by Richard Morrison on the 20th August, this bird remained in the area up until the 1st September.

Southern Lapwing Vanellus chilensis

Micky Reeves reported a single bird at East Pond, Sea Lion Island on the 6th October and another single bird south of the airstrip on Sea Lion Island on the 10th October. Charlene Rowland saw a single bird at New Island settlement on the 21st November. A single bird was also reported from Fox Bay by Keith Knight on the 6th December.

Tawny-throated Dotterel Oreopholus ruficollis

Micky Reeves saw a single bird at Bull Hill, Sea Lion Island on the 4th September. On the 30th September Diane Towersey reported finding a dead bird in her garden at Port Stephens settlement.

Whimbrel Numenius phaeopus hudsonicus

Will Wagstaff reported seeing a single bird at Sea Lion Island on the 14th November.

Sanderling Calidris alba

Alan Henry saw nine birds at Bertha's Beach on the 20th March.

Baird's Sandpiper Calidris bairdii

Micky Reeves reported a single bird at East Pond, Sea Lion Island on the 6th October and another at Bull Hill, Sea Lion Island on the 18th October. Two birds were seen just to the south of the Lagoon, Sea Lion Island on the 6th & 7th November, Mike Morrison. A single bird at the ponds on the south side of the road, Cape Pembroke on the 10th November, Sue Morrison. Seven birds at this location on the 22nd November, Mike and Sue Morrison, six birds on the 25th November, Alan Henry, and six birds again on the 31st December, Mike and Sue Morrison. Alan Henry saw four birds at Yorke Bay Pond, Cape Pembroke on the 11th November.

Spotted Sandpiper Actitis macularia

A single bird seen by Jeremy Bird on the 10th November near to FIPASS, Stanley Harbour, and this bird remained in the area until at least the 22nd December. This is the first record of this species in the Falkland Islands.

Wilson's Phalarope Phalaropus tricolor

Two birds at Whale Point, Fitzroy on the 9th January one bird at Kelp Point and the other on the north end of Big Pond both with White-rumped Sandpipers, Mike and Sue Morrison, one of the birds still present on the 31st January.

Chilean Skua Catharacta chilensis

Alan Henry photographed a single bird on the water from the *FPV Protagate* whilst on fisheries patrol at the western edge of the zone on the 15th December at position 52°.14′S, 63°.18′W.

Franklin's Gull Larus pipixcan

A single bird at Sea Lion Island on the 14th November seen by Micky Reeves.

Eared Dove Zenaida auriculata

On the 1st March Alan Henry saw a single bird in flight from Mink Park, Stanley heading in a westerly direction.

White-crested Elaenia Elaenia albiceps

A single bird was reported by Sonia Felton at Government House gardens on the 2nd November, and remained in the area for three weeks; the last report was from Tim Bonner who saw it on the 25th November.

Another single bird was seen by Alan Henry when it landed on the *FPV Protagate* staying on board for about three hours before flying off in a westerly direction.

Fire-eyed Diucon Xolmis pyrope

The birds reported on in the last report, were still sighted in Stanley over the next five weeks.

One on the wall at KEM Hospital on the 3rd July, Sue Morrison, another sighting by Sue was on the fields by the FIPASS road on the 15th July. Tim Stenning saw one at 5B Ross Road West on the 29th July. Carol Morrison saw one in the yard at 10 Fitzroy Road East on the 4th August. Nick Bonner saw one at 8A St Mary's Walk on the 5th August, and the last report was from Jamie Simpson who sighted one at 7 Racecourse Road on the 9th August.

Eastern Kingbird Tyrannus tyrannus

Will Wagstaff saw a single bird on Pebble Island on the 25th November.

Chilean Swallow Tachycineta meyeni

Three birds were seen by Micky Reeves at the tussac at the west end of Sea Lion Island on the 24th February. A single bird at Cape Dolphin house late afternoon of the 13th March, Mike and Sue Morrison. Two birds were seen by Kristiane Thorsen at the Market Garden flying towards the Seamen's Centre on the 28th March. Two birds were seen on the 2nd April by Alan Henry on Fitzroy Road and later in the day on Moody Brooke Road, Alan also seen a single bird at Gypsy Cove on the 3rd and 4th April. Micky Reeves saw a single bird at the junction of Fitzroy Road and Snake Street on the 5th April. Six birds were seen by Alan Henry on Fitzroy Road on the 7th April. On the 9th April phone calls from Nic Huin and Alan Henry alerted us to three birds at the junction of James Street and Snake Street, and another bird at Fitzroy Road, very tame flying low to the ground and landing frequently on the fence posts, possibly exhausted having just arrived in the islands. Phyllis Rendell reported four birds at Ross Road West on the 11th April, Phyllis also noted they were very tame.

Southern House Wren Troglodytes aedon

Alan Henry sighted a single bird near to Gypsy Cove along the sand grass at Yorke Bay on the 1st September. Charlene Rowland also reported a single bird at New Island settlement on the 23rd March. Marie Deligniers reported a single bird at Dunbar farm on the 19th May which had been there for a few days, still present at the farm in early October 2016.

White-banded Mockingbird Mimus triurus

A single bird at West Point Island was reported by Thies and Kicki on the 21st April it had been about for a couple of weeks.

Mourning Sierra-Finch Phrygilus fruticeti

A single adult male bird at New Island settlement in late November but was fatally harassed by the Falkland Thrush's (pers. comm.) Charlene Rowland.

Rufous-collared Sparrow Zonotrichia capensis

A single bird was reported by Marie Deligniers at Dunbar farm on the 26th July. Charlene Rowland reported up to six birds at New Island and had been resident for several months.

Micky Reeves saw a single male at the small pond on Sea Lion Island on the 25th March.

American Redstart Setophaga ruticilla

The bird sighted in Stanley and mentioned in the last report was found dead by Colin Smith in his greenhouse on James Street, Stanley on the 23rd August. Colin said that he had seen the bird in the area about a month previously; the bird had accessed the greenhouse through a window which had a pane missing.

Must include - and is Ray Tipper's photo - Tropical Parula Setophaga pitiayumi

On the 22nd November an Avian Adventures bird tour group, sighted a single bird on diddle Dee shrub on Pebble Island just to the east of Cape Coventry as they driving back towards the settlement. Report and photos by Ray Tipper. This is the first record of this species in the Falkland Islands.

Double-collared Seedeater Sporophila caerulescens

A single female bird at Volunteer house reported by Derek Pettersson on the 4th April, myself, Alan Henry and Micky Reeves visited the site the next day where we observed it feeding on the seed of Yorkshire Fog *Holcus lanatus* and roosting in the cover of the nearby Macrocarpa trees *Cupressus macrocarpa*. This is the second record of this species in the Falkland Islands a male bird was seen on New Island in February 2009.

Shiny Cowbird Molothrus bonariensis

Paul Robertson seen a 'jet black bird' at Port Stephens settlement on the 27th September, the bird was only seen briefly on the ground before it flew off, which may have been this species, Paul specially noted the dark green pattern on the back which could relate to an adult male in breeding plumage.
